Presumably, the soldiers did not do much shopping in Hertford! However, for most of its history Hertford has been a prosperous commercial centre.

Did the good ladies of the 17th Century follow the maxim of “shop till you drop”? Alan will no doubt enlighten us.

How the Town was Run: Hertford Corporation 1900

Philip is a member of our Society. He has made a particular study of the civic life of Hertford in the late 19th and early 20th Centuries.

Decision making and contracting for public works was carried out by the men of a few important families: e.g. Longmores and MacMullens. These men sent their employees on errands and tasks around the town. They acted both as clients and contractors.

Administration was remarkably simple. Things got done! (The Library had been opened in 1888.)
